## Year 11 GCSE Results

\*'Progress 8' is the new measure for students at the end of year 11. This shows the progress students made across 8 of their key subjects during the 5 years of secondary school. A school's Progress 8 score greater than 0 means they did better than similar students nationally. St Cuthbert Mayne's score in 2017 is estimated to be -0.009. This means, on average, all students made the progress that expected of them, when compared to similar students nationally.

*Further statistical information for Year 11:*

- No student left year 11 in 2017 without a place in further education, training or employment.
- 6/12 students (50%) who took the 'English Baccalaureate' suite of qualifications (English, Maths, Science, Language, Humanity) achieved a C grade or better in all of these subjects.

*Further statistical information for Sixth Form:*

- The value added score for students last year was +0.06. This means that students are making expected progress in the sixth form.
- the average grade that students achieved last year was a C-.
- student 'retention' (the percentage of students who get to the end of their study programme), using the ALPS progression measure of Actual number of A level students over the Expected number, progression this year was 100% .
- No student left year 13 in 2017 without a place in further education, training or employment.
- Students re-sitting GCSE Maths and English:  
English: 10/13 students improved their grade of which 4 gained a C grade and 3 gained a B grade.  
Maths: 7/29 students improved their grade of which 4 gained a C grade.
